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
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Brother Jim Jaco is on the far left of the picture, just beside the American Flag which he loves so much.

FAMOUS MASONS - R.W. BRO. JAMES BUCHANAN

Here in our famous masons spot, we find yet another President of the United States, Right Worshipful Brother James Buchanan. R.W. Bro. Buchanan was 15th President. Born April 23, 1791, in Pennsylvania the second of ten children. He was elected president during a tumultuous time of our history when the nation was struggling with the issue of slavery. There was also financial turmoil in the nation as well. Three states were admitted to the Union during his tenure, Minnesota, Oregon and Kansas. The latter was admitted as a "slave state" which was a major factor for his name not appearing on the subsequent ballot in northern states. The period of 1860-61 was so divisive that Bro. Buchanan dissolved his Cabinet and replaced all southern sympathizers with hard liners. This is merely the surface of Right Worshipful Bro. Buchanan. Initiated Dec. 11, 1816, he was Master of Lancaster Lodge # 43 from 1822-1823. R.W. Bro. Buchanan served as District Deputy Grand Master of Pennsylvania in 1824. He would live to see the nation at war with itself. He died June

MASONIC EDUCATION - CAVALRY OR MOUNT MORIAH

Cavalry - This is the Latin name for the place where Jesus's crucifixion took place, called in the Hebrew *Golgotha*, meaning a "skull." It is a small hill or eminence, situated due west from Mt. Moriah, on which the Temple of Solomon was built. This small hill is identified with certain events referred to in the Third Degree. The fact that Mount Calvary is situated in a *westward direction* from the Temple, and *near Mt*. *Moriah*; that it is on the *direct road from Jerusa-lem to Joppa*; that it is *outside the gate of the Temple*, lend importance to Masonic leg-

ends. The *cleft*, or cave, *in the rock* forming this hill in which subsequently the burial of the body of Jesus was made also identifies Calvary with the spot where the *weary traveler sat down to rest*; and the resurrection of Jesus from this cavesepulcher is most strikingly represented in Masonry. Other interesting traditions relating to Mt. Calvary are preserved in Freemasonry. One is that it was the burial place of Adam, and that the place where he who brought ruin and death upon mankind was buried afterwards

became the place where the Savior of mankind died, was buried, and rose again. Another tradition relates the erection of a nine-arched vault by Enoch beneath the bowels of Mt. Calvary and that deposited on the foundation-stone was the Ineffable Name which is the symbol of Divine Truth in speculative Masonry. Corn, Wine and Oil – Peace, Harmony and Strength by Brother Jan Barkan

All should be paid their due. It helps to ensure organizations harmony. It is seen as important enough to Masonry, so that it is one of the main jobs of the Senior Warden.

Payment can be made in many ways. Some see to the needs of the body and others see to the enrichment and needs of the soul.

One allegory of the Fellow Craft is that payments of corn, wine and oil were made in King's Solomon's Temple to operative masons. It alludes to the peace, harmony and strength paid to Free and Accepted Masons when they have worked diligently to learn their craft.

While I have found many differing and beautiful ways to symbolize portions of the Fellow Craft lecture within the Lodges I have visited in Columbia, South Carolina I have missed the artifacts presented to me in my original home lodge in Miami, Florida, that of the containers of corn, wine and oil which accompanied the lecture.

I feel that the physical presentations of these items aided me in focusing on the allegory. I have therefore created and presented trays of these items to three lodges I have visited within this area.

The items are not very expensive as they relate to money. The 3 containers I got on sale for 60 cents each, the glass trays at a dollar store. I used kosher wine and olive oil as those are what would have been used in Solomon's temple and the corn, which was a little harder to find, was bagged popcorn kernels. As they say in the MasterCard commercials (the meaning) is priceless.

(Directions: bottles should be tightly stoppered and glued closed with the bottles glued to the tray. Don't use superglue (in a closed hot lodge it will evaporate over time).
